Received some updates on ongoing efforts

#### **General comments:**

- The DSM isn't really set up to evaluate all of the CPAR actions at this time. In some cases we probably could (e.g., spring pulse flows on the Moke). However, more often than not the CPAR actions are too specific and/or tailored to a spatial/temporal resolution that isn't currently modeled.
- We would need greater specificity in amounts and timing.
- For actions not in Tech Memo: Per the CVPIA Fish Program process, actions that are not consistent with SIT Tech Memo priorities have zero or a near zero chance of being funded. Carrying forward CPAR actions that do not have supporting scientific rationale seems is unwarranted.








Spawning habitat per spawner




Survival within a tributary






# After the Restoration Strategy What's next?
